Augusta National Women's Amateur 2026 Championship Overview



DATE	April 1-4, 2026
FORMAT	54 holes of stroke play with a cut for the leading 30 players and ties after 36 holes. In the event of a tie after 54 holes, the winner will be decided by a sudden-death playoff.
SCHEDULE	The first 36 holes will be contested at Champions Retreat Golf Club in Augusta, Ga., April 1-2, 2026. The entire field will then play Augusta National for an official practice round on Friday, April 3. The final round will take place at Augusta National on Saturday, April 4, and will feature the leading 30 players, including ties, who made the cut.
VENUES	The opening 36 holes will be played on the Island and Bluff nines at Champions Retreat Golf Club. The Island nine is an Arnold Palmer design and will serve as the first nine, while the Bluff nine, designed by Jack Nicklaus, will serve as the second nine. Friday's practice round and the final competitive round will take place at Augusta National Golf Club, home of the Masters Tournament.

TV COVERAGE

The first and second rounds of the Augusta National Women's Amateur will be broadcast live on Golf Channel (1:30-3:30 p.m. ET) from Champions Retreat Golf Club. NBC will produce and broadcast three hours (Noon-3 p.m. ET) of live final-round coverage of the event at Augusta National. Additionally, Golf Channel's "Live From the Masters" will commence on Friday, April 3 at Augusta National to provide coverage of the Augusta National Women's Amateur, the Drive, Chip and Putt National Finals and the Masters Tournament.

HISTORY

During his annual press conference at the 2018 Masters, Chairman Fred Ridley announced the creation of the Augusta National Women's Amateur. Set to commence the week prior to the Masters, the event was designed to inspire greater interest and participation in women's golf and create a new, exciting pathway for these players to fulfill their dreams.

Jennifer Kupcho, the world's top-ranked amateur, played her final six holes in five under par, including an eagle on the par-five 13th at Augusta National, to win the inaugural Augusta National Women's Amateur in 2019. The 2020 championship was canceled due to the effects of the global COVID-19 pandemic. Seventeen-year-old Tsubasa Kajitani became the first international ANWA champion and the first winner from Japan at Augusta National in any tournament with her playoff victory over Wake Forest's Emilia Migliaccio in 2021. In 2022, 16-year-old Anna Davis became the youngest champion after a three-under-par 69 in the final round at Augusta National. In 2023, after two and a half years as the No. 1 amateur in the world, Rose Zhang defeated Jenny Bae in a two-hole playoff. Englishwoman Lottie Woad birdied three of her final four holes to edge Bailey Shoemaker by one stroke in 2024. Carla Bernat Escuder broke the Championship scoring record by two strokes in her 2025 win over Asterisk Talley, finishing at 12 under par to become the first Spaniard to win the Augusta National Women's Amateur.

FIELD

The field for the 2026 Championship will consist of players based on the following qualifications:

1. Reigning U.S. Women's Amateur champion
2. Reigning Women's Amateur champion
3. Reigning Women's Amateur Asia-Pacific champion
4. Reigning Girls' Amateur champion
5. Reigning U.S. Girls' Junior champion
6. Reigning Girls Junior PGA champion
7. Reigning NCAA Division I Women's Individual champion
8. Past champions of the Augusta National Women's Amateur within the last five years
9. The 30 highest ranked players from the United States of America based on the prior year's (2025) final Women's World Amateur Golf Ranking, not otherwise qualified
10. After qualifications 1-8 above, the 30 highest ranked players not otherwise qualified, as listed on the prior year's (2025) final Women's World Amateur Ranking
11. Players receiving special invitations by the Augusta National Women's Amateur Committee

AWARDS

Provided she remains an amateur, the 2026 Augusta National Women's Amateur champion will receive an invitation to the next five Augusta National Women's Amateurs, the 2026 U.S. Women's Open, the 2026 Women's Open, the 2026 Chevron Championship, the 2026 Evian Championship and any USGA, R&A and PGA of America amateur championships for which she is eligible for one year.

Augusta National Women's Amateur 2025 Recap

Bernat Escuder Exemplifies Spanish Brilliance

Performing with poise on a stage where her countrymen have shined, Carla Bernat Escuder authored a new chapter in 2025 in the history of Spanish brilliance at Augusta National.

The Spaniard shot four-under 68 in all three rounds of the Championship to finish at 12 under par, breaking the scoring record by two strokes.

Bernat Escuder started the final round in a tie for third place, one stroke behind the 36-hole leaders, American Kiara Romero and defending champion Lottie Woad of England. With four birdies and a bogey on her first nine, she moved into the lead by one.

Later in the round, runner-up Asterisk Talley birdied Nos. 16 and 17 to move to 11 under par, two behind Bernat Escuder, whose bogey at the 17th in the group behind reduced the deficit to one.

Before her final putt on 18, Bernat Escuder knew just where she stood.

"I looked at the scoreboard, and I was like, you need to knock this in because she's right behind you," she said.

Bernat Escuder holed a downhill five-foot putt for par on her final hole, in front of a sizable gathering of patrons, to win the Augusta National Women's Amateur by one stroke over Talley.

One of six Spaniards in the 2025 field, Bernat Escuder said she was delighted to be the first from her country to win the Augusta National Women's Amateur.

"Hopefully, it doesn't stay like that, because I want more Spaniards to get here and keep pushing our country up and up," she said. "Yeah, hopefully I'm not the last one."

Woad Comes Up Clutch, Captures Title

The fifth edition of the Augusta National Women's Amateur tested both the nerves and the skill of even the most talented competitors in the field. Still, there was not a single turn in the winding road that England's Lottie Woad was not prepared for.

It was Bailey Shoemaker of the University of Southern California who had provided Woad with a push by posting a terrific bogey-free round (dual 33s on each nine), lifting her to seven-under-par 209.

Woad may have been down following a bogey on No. 13, but her steely determination meant she never was out. The 20-year-old Florida State University sophomore was adamant to stay in the mix until the end, and what an ending she would write.

Hard work, especially on her putting, was the winning formula for a historic finish that proved just enough. With birdies at three of her last four holes, Woad carded a three-under 69, moving her to eight-under 208, one stroke clear of Shoemaker.

When Woad, leading by two to start the day, suddenly found herself chasing, she birdied the par-5 15th to pull within one, tied Shoemaker with a 12-foot birdie at 17 and then pulled off the clincher at the uphill 18th. Woad smashed a deep drive, just as she had done at 17, then hit a “shoulder-to-shoulder” 9-iron from 130 yards to 15 feet. The putt was a downhill double-breaker, which only heightened the tale. Woad met the moment.

“Luckily, it broke back right at the end,” Woad said. “I was hoping it was going to be a nice, stress-free day, but it was far from that. In the end, it’s a cooler way to finish.”

Rose Zhang Claims 2023 Victory in a Playoff

After four annual attempts, a weather delay of more than three hours, a mid-round grip change and a two-hole playoff, World No. 1 amateur Rose Zhang claimed one of the few titles that had eluded her in an illustrious amateur career: the Augusta National Women's Amateur.

Beginning the day with a five-stroke lead after setting the Championship's 36-hole scoring record, Zhang made a double bogey on the first hole and was four over par through seven holes when play was suspended due to inclement weather.

After play resumed, she played even par the rest of the way as Bae, playing one group ahead, went three under over her final 10 holes, pulling even with Zhang with a tap-in birdie at No. 17.

The playoff began at No. 18 where Zhang and Bae both made par. The two continued on to No. 10 where each player found the fairway off the tee. Zhang's approach found the green while Bae's shot went left into the shrubs. When Bae was unable to save par, Zhang two-putted to claim the title.

The Stanford University sophomore shot 66-65-76 to finish nine under par, while Bae, a fifth-year senior at the University of Georgia, shot 69-68-70.

"I'm just really proud of myself in terms of how I was able to overcome so much media, so much expectation: going into this event everyone was talking about how I should win, how this will finalize the trio of amateur golf," Zhang said, referring to having won the U.S. Women's Amateur and the individual and team NCAA Division I women's golf titles at Stanford.

Davis Comes From Behind, Becomes Youngest Champion

Wearing a bucket hat reminiscent of a youthful Jack Nicklaus, 16-year-old Anna Davis joined the Golden Bear and so many other legendary golfers in the annals of champions at Augusta National.

Davis shot 70-76-69 to become the youngest champion in Augusta National Women's Amateur history. The high school sophomore from Spring Valley, California, overcame a two-stroke deficit with her three-under-par final round.

Davis finished with a one-under-par 215 total, outlasting the field by one stroke. At No. 100 in the World Amateur Golf Ranking entering the Championship, Davis had four birdies in her final round, including three birdies over a five-hole stretch on Nos. 9-13.

"I'm still a little shocked — I don't think it's processed that I won here," Davis said. "It's pretty surreal, to be honest. I'm pretty speechless. I can't even fathom what just happened."

Beatrice Wallin and Latanna Stone, co-leaders to begin the final round, faltered, opening the door for Davis to lock up the come-from-behind victory. Stone led by two strokes with two to play after a birdie at 16, but a double-bogey at No. 17 and a bogey at the 18th catapulted Davis to the top.

Stone and her Louisiana State University teammate, Ingrid Lindblad, tied for runner-up while Amari Avery, Benedetta Moresco and Wallin finished T-4.

Kajitani Wins Playoff to Become First International Champion

Seventeen-year-old Tsubasa Kajitani of Japan defeated Emilia Migliaccio on the first hole of a sudden-death playoff to win the 2021 Augusta National Women's Amateur. Kajitani shot 73-72-72 for a one-over-par 217 total and became the first player from Japan to win at Augusta National.

"I can't really imagine [the reception I will receive] when I'm back to Japan," Kajitani said. "But hopefully everybody is happy and will enjoy, and I'm looking forward to going back to Japan."

Migliaccio, then a 21-year-old senior at Wake Forest, recorded five final-round birdies en route to a two-under-par 70 while the final group was on No. 13.

Kajitani, ranked No. 26 in the World Amateur Golf Ranking (WAGR), entered the final round tied for fifth place. While others were jockeying for position and going through ups and downs, she remained steady and continued to quietly navigate her round. After an early bogey on the par-3 fourth hole, Kajitani rebounded with birdies on Nos. 8, 14 and 15.

But Kajitani ran into trouble with a double bogey on the par-4 17th. However, she made par on No. 18 to tie Migliaccio with the clubhouse lead, then sat back to watch the final three groups finish.

The playoff returned to the 18th hole and Migliaccio hit her second shot right of the right-greenside bunker. Her third found the bunker and she was not able to get up and down, finishing with a bogey 5.

Six players – Pauline Roussin, Rachel Heck, Emma Spitz, Karen Fredgaard and second-round co-leaders Ingrid Lindblad and Rose Zhang – tied for third place, one stroke behind Kajitani and Migliaccio. Olivia Mehaffey was alone in ninth place, two strokes off the lead.

Kupcho Surges to Claim Inaugural Title

Jennifer Kupcho, the world's top-ranked amateur, played her final six holes in five under par, including an eagle on the par-5 13th, to prevail against Mexico's Maria Fassi and become the first champion of the Augusta National Women's Amateur.

The Wake Forest senior trailed playing partner Fassi by two strokes after 12 holes. Her eagle on No. 13 kickstarted an impressive second-nine stretch that also included birdies on the par-5 15th, par-3 16th and par-4 18th.

The 21-year-old from Westminster, Colo., was fighting a migraine that resulted in blurry vision as she made the turn. She battled back to record a five-under-par 67 – fittingly, the lowest round of the Championship – to tally a 10-under-par 206 total for the three rounds and win by four strokes.

"It's always a great feeling to win," said Kupcho. "But I think to win at Augusta National, just to get to walk the fairways and walk up 18 with as many fans as there were, it's an experience like none other."

The reigning NCAA individual champion punctuated her victory with a 25-foot birdie putt on the final hole.

"I think, first of all, for me to hit the first tee shot of the tournament, just to open it up, it was a great honor to be able to do that," said Kupcho, who hit the very first drive of the inaugural Championship in the first round.

"And then to be able to hit the last putt and to win, it's just amazing. It's an amazing feeling, to have my brother here, to have my parents here, everyone out there supporting me. It was quite a day."

Fassi finished runner-up with a Championship total of six-under-par 210. She was followed by Yuka Saso of the Philippines (214) and Yuka Yasuda of Japan (214), who tied for third.

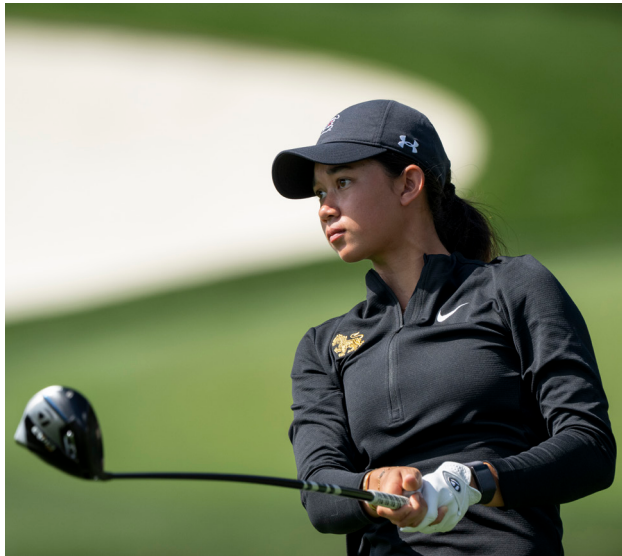
